

Hamilton County Tax List 1883 & 1890/91

The earliest Hamilton County tax records I have found on microfilm are those for the years 1883 and 1890/91. Referred to as the "Tax Duplicate", the books are arranged by cities and townships. Each one is in alphabetical order by surname or business. Then, in Columns; Range, Town, Sect., Quar., No. of Lot, Feet, Square, Division etc., No. of acres, Value, Delinquent taxes and penalty of previous year, Taxes due Dec. date (this year), special taxes, Remarks & Marginal Taxes, Remarks & Marginal Taxes.

I have been given permission by the county Treasurer's office to digitize these and make available to the public online. Although we have county directories for the 1890's, these add additional data to either assist in property search in the Recorder's Office and property value at a time when the Federal Census is missing due to fire. At this time I am still studying the records as to how best to make them available.

Notice of Library Closure By Jeff Herbert

New Year's Resolution-Publish Your Family History

Most genealogists aspire to publish their family history "sometime." The time has never been better. As always, the Library can assist with research, but now it can also help publish your work. Starting in early January, the Espresso Book Machine in the Main Library's MakerSpace can print and bind in soft cover, professional quality, affordable books. The books will be assigned ISBN numbers through the Library with authors retaining full rights. Personal copies of any Library book in the public domain will also be available for on-demand printing. Where's the Desk?

If your last visit to the Genealogy and Local History (G&LH) Department was before October 27, you will notice a big change upon your next visit—no Reference Desk. This change was implemented to bring full mobile service to the department and foster more collaboration between librarians and researchers. Now G&LH librarians can escort you to the shelves to look for books and at the same time look up call numbers, locations and status of materials, or conduct in-depth research with you, while seated at your table. The area vacated by the Reference Desk has made room for a research alcove with tables and seating that is closer to computers, the Genealogy and Local History Office, and has less distraction as it is out of traffic flow.

Re-cataloged Cemetery Books

In the spirit of improved access, the Library is re-cataloging all genealogical cemetery books so they will be shelved next to related genealogical material. Previously, with the exception of Hamilton County books, researchers had to look two places for books covering the same geographic area, 929.3 for genealogy books and 929.5 for cemetery books. Many genealogists were unaware that there was a

second place to look. Starting with Ohio, cemetery books will be reclassified as 929.3 and shelved along with genealogy books from the same county. This reorganization will allow us to devote at least one full shelf to each county in Ohio, making browsing significantly easier. As this issue goes to press, 1/4 of the Ohio counties have been re-cataloged with a goal of completing the entire state by late April in time for the Ohio Genealogical Society Conference.

Collection Updates

During the last quarter of 2015, Genealogy and Local History purchased almost 300 new genealogy books covering: Lucas and Monroe County, Ohio; Somerset, Kentucky; Wayne County, Michigan and Claiborne County, Tennessee.

G&LH expanded its yearbook collection by 225 volumes in 2015, all through donations. These books are a great source of information about ancestors and are especially valued because they contain pictures. Yearbooks from the Library's collection are beginning to appear on the Digihttp://digital.cincinnatilibrary.org/cdm/ Library. landingpage/collection/p16998coll3. In order to display yearbooks online or make them available in print form, the Library must first own the volumes. It is our goal to cover the entire Greater Cincinnati region, including areas currently underrepresented, such as Amelia, Loveland and Glen Este high schools. New to the Digital Library

The Local History Index cards are now available on the Digital Library, http://digital.cincinnatilibrary.org/cdm/landingpage/collection/p16998coll47.

Created prior to the mid-20th century by librarians, this index continues to be one of the best sources for information about 19th century Cincinnati and its people. The Digital Library allows the researcher to go beyond the subject heading at the top of the cards and search the full text of each card. As an added bonus, many of the books cited in the Local History Index are also available for distance viewing, downloading and printing through the Digital Library.

Tip from the G&LH Reference Team

Irish specialist and G&LH librarian Colleen Phillips uses Catholic Parish registers dating back to the 1740s for her research. They are now available for free online from the
