## War of 1812 Pension Funds

At the recent Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) 2016 convention in Springfield, Illinois it was announced at the opening session that all the needed funds to preserve and digitize the War of 1812 pension files at the National Archives had been raised.

A benefactor who wished to remain anonymous, recently donated \$500,000, and this was in turn matched by Ancestry.com for a total contribution of \$1,000,000, which put the fund over the top. In the coming months, the project will be completed and all the War of 1812 pension files will be digitized and uploaded onto the Fold3.com website where they can be accessed for free by researchers.

## Library News from The Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County

### Genealogy and the Cincinnati Streetcar

After more than 60 years, Cincinnati streetcars are again carrying passengers through the streets of Cincinnati. The Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County served as an opening weekend host in September, offering programs on historic streetcar workers and Cincinnati transportation history. Genealogy was at the core of the program, *It's a Family Affair: Cincinnati's Early Streetcar Conductors, Drivers and Mechanics*, where we worked with descendants of early streetcar workers and Library resources to develop three fascinating family histories.



Since the opening of the streetcar, a number of genealogy groups have visited the Library for customized genealogy programs and a designated work space, followed by a streetcar ride. Stop #16 is just outside the Library doors on Walnut Street and goes to the Banks and Findlay Market. The Library is a great place to bring a group, either a formal organization or people you pull together, for a day of research. ### Building Digital Collections from the Community

Across the country libraries are recognizing that valuable historical and genealogical resources, especially photographs, letters, memorabilia, and personal memories are in the hands of individuals and families. In an effort to enhance library collections and share these important resources, the Genealogy and Local History Department has worked on a number of community based digital initiatives over the past several years, including *Ohio River Floods*, <http://digital.cincinnati.library.org/cdm/landingpage/collection/p16998coll11> and the *Veterans History Project*,

one of the longest sustained collection of oral interviews by a local organization with nearly 500 Cincinnati interviews covering World War II through Vietnam, <http://vhp.cincinnati.library.org/>. This summer the Library added two more community based collections, *Cincinnati's Brewing History*, <http://digital.cincinnati.library.org/cdm/landingpage/collection/p16998coll64> and *Streetcar History*, <http://digital.cincinnati.library.org/cdm/landingpage/collection/p16998coll63>. All collections are open and still adding resources. ### Collection Update

- The latest volumes of *Map Guide to German Parish Registers*

- The final installment of Dr. Robert J. Wimberg's *Cincinnati and the Civil War*

Donations play a key role in Genealogy and Local History's collection development. Recently a sizeable donation was dropped off at the Wyoming Branch, enabling us to enhance our collection of Tennessee and Virginia genealogy books as well as surname books for the Jacob Good and Beery families. If you are downsizing your personal collection, consider checking with the Genealogy and Local History Department to see if your materials can fill in gaps in the Library's collection. We can most efficiently assess possible donations, if provided with a list for consideration.

Dale's family had a long German heritage, and with his research he accomplished the publication of his family book, - *An Example For US All*. 
- One member compiles the calendar of events, and another member proofreads articles.

### “WHITEWATER SHAKER VILLAGE OF CROSBY TOWNSHIP”

The **Whitewater Shaker Village** is a former Shaker settlement in Crosby Township in Northwestern Hamilton County. In 1823, several families joined the Shaker community, eventually growing to over a thousand acres in Hamilton and Butler Counties. They operated a grist mill, sawmill, sold seeds, apples, cider, preserved fruits, raised fish and silkworms. In 1991, Great Parks of Hamilton County purchased much of the remaining Whitewater buildings and land. This is the largest collection of Shaker buildings in Ohio and one of the most intact of all Shaker Villages.

Ed Creighton is Executive Director of the Oxford Museum Association, speaker for the Butler County Historical Society, and a board member of The Friends of Whitewater Shaker Village.
